Tranforming Church Insight Update

October 2022

MUMC has now completed its first year in the "Transforming Church: A Visioning Roadmap" program, a three-year journey of discovery, visioning, and coaching that will help us to design a custom roadmap to guide us into the next phase of a vibrant ministry. It has been a deeply intensive process that was difficult at times, yet very rewarding. As expected, there was a range of thoughts and ideas, but also much in common. We want to share with you what we have found as well as the next phase.

We thought an excellent next step is for you to meet John Holm, our consultant throughout this journey, in person for the "congregational debrief" that we promised to you earlier. John has agreed to come to MUMC on October 12 to discuss the Transforming Church process, give you an update on what we have done so far, and most importantly to give all an opportunity to ask questions. Here are the basics:

presentation will also be livestreamed for those of you who cannot make it in person.

We would love to see you there! This will be a great opportunity to share a meal, celebrate together what we have done, and look forward.

To summarize where we are, Year One was dedicated to Discovery and Visioning. Our Discovery process was all about understanding who we are as a congregation and what matters most to us, which is critical to preserving our essence and our identity (i.e., our "Core"). We heard

your voices through surveys, focus groups, and listening sessions. You told us about your most meaningful memories, your positive stories, and the unsung "heroes" in our congregation. We also learned more about our local community through demographic studies provided by John Holm and by conducting external focus groups with local organizations. Our goal was to lean heavily on your input to narrow the themes to four "Core Values." Doing so will help us to preserve what is most important to us going forward. Here are the four **Core Values** of MUMC we developed:

Sharing God's grace through:

- A warm, welcoming, and inclusive environment
- Authentic relationships
- A nurturing approach to spiritual growth
- Impactful service and stewardship



Based on our Core Values, we also developed a new Mission Statement, which explains why we exist, our beneficiary, and our objective. Ideally, the Mission Statement should be brief. The listening sessions held over the summer were so helpful in this process. After much discussion and prayer, we decided the following **Mission Statement** best captures all of those great ideas:

"Connecting people to Jesus Christ and to one another"

Year One has also been about Visioning. Our Vision is our intended result. The Transforming Church leadership team, comprised of members of the congregation, Administrative Council, and staff, just completed our second retreat in September. We incorporated our Core Values, our Mission, and our Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (a "SWOT" analysis) into a visioning exercise that asked these questions:

- What would we like to be most different about our church in ten years?
- What, specifically and collectively, are we most passionate about as a church?

- What is the greatest need in our community?
- What would you like to be most different about our local community in ten years?
- What can we do potentially better than anyone else in the community?

Our task was to state a bold Vision for MUMC that reflects our Core Values, our Mission, and our "SWOT" analysis. Or as John Holm put it, a "BHAG" (from the book "Built to Last," a Big Hairy Audacious Goal) that requires God's help. Here is our **Vision:**

"To be THE bridge to community connection, collaboration, and common ground through Jesus Christ."

As we finished the September retreat, we began to pivot toward how we intend to use this work to define our strategic priorities going forward. Strategy is the process of focusing our resources to fulfill our Mission, in alignment with our Core Values, and in light of our ever-changing context (the community and society around us). The process will ultimately help us to develop strategies that: 1) Align with a Core Value; 2) Connect with a Target Audience; 3) Address a Strength, Weakness, Opportunity, or Threat; and 4) Propel the Mission Forward. We have begun this process and have identified four **Strategic Priorities:**

- Build a culture and identity around our core values and mission (given to all cohort churches)
- Create a community gathering place to meet the emotional, physical, and spiritual needs of people in our region (leveraging our Facilities, a strength)
- Create an engaging environment that fosters a passionate desire in our congregation to serve God (building on Outreach as a strength)
- Engage members and the community with a strong digital connection (addressing a weakness)

As we have emphasized before, this is a journey for all of us together. We need and want all of you to be a part of this effort. Years Two and Three of the three-year process is the implementation phase as we refine and implement our roadmap, so there is much more to come.

We thank each of you so much for participating in this transformative process and for being part of the MUMC community. May God bless us all and give us wisdom.

In reflecting on Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan, Martin Luther King, Jr. said something about doing justice as the people of God in this broken world. One day we must come to see that the whole Jericho road must be transformed so that men and women will not be constantly beaten and robbed as they make their journey on life's highway. True compassion is more than flinging a coin to a beggar; it is not haphazard and superficial. It comes to see that an edifice which produces beggars needs restructuring. ("Beyond Vietnam: A Time to Break Silence")

Regarding climate change, justice (true compassion according to Martin Luther King, Jr.) calls us to ask why climate is changing and why there are so many more weather disasters than ever before all over the planet. It also challenges us to see that our lifestyle which produces climate change needs be changed.

Our all-church growth group study this fall, Saving Us, is our response to that call. Together we will learn what has gone wrong with "the whole Jericho road" and discuss and share what we can do to become better stewards for God's creation and His gift to us, the planet, our home on this side of eternity.

Week One (Oct. 11 and 13): Fact vs. Opinions Week Two (Oct. 18 and 20): Christians' Stewardship for God's Creation Week Three (Oct. 25 and 27): What can and should we do?

Growth Group Study Coming in October "Stewardship for God's Creation"

"People are seeing the impact of climate change around them in extraordinary patterns of floods and droughts, wildfires, heatwaves and powerful storms" says John Holdren, Director of Woodwell Climate Research Center. Yet, opinions on climate change still run the gamut from "the planet is on fire" to "there is no such thing as climate change." Mequon United Methodist Church (MUMC) will host a 3-week discussion series based on science and faith in October 2022. The series is open to all people who are interested in exploring the impact of current atmospheric conditions and what the impact means for our lives now as well as for the future of our children's children.

In the Great Lakes Midwest region, huge increases in precipitation have already been recorded. How are those increases impacting our cities and rural areas now? People of faith respond to the needs of people whenever bad things happen and need is evident. Is there anything people of faith can or should do to offset conditions that cause bad things to happen? Our discussion will begin with what we can all agree on – how climate change is affecting us – and generate positive viable solutions.

This study and discussion will be based on research by Dr. Katharine Hayhoe, an atmospheric climate scientist who believes in God, and her latest book *Saving Us: A Climate Scientist's Case for Hope and Healing in a Divided World.* She is a remarkable communicator who was named as one of Time Magazine's 100 Most Influential People, Foreign Policy's 100 Leading Thinkers, and Fortune Magazine's World's Greatest Leaders, and in 2019 was awarded the United Nations Champions of the Earth in Science and Innovation. She received a Bachelor of Science in Physics from the University of Toronto and a Master of Science and Ph.D. in Atmospheric Science from the University of Illinois.

The series will be offered at two different times each week. The in-person sessions will be at MUMC on Tuesdays from 11 am to 12 noon, on October 11, October 18, and October 25. The Zoom sessions will be offered on Thursdays from 7 to 8 pm, on October 13, October 20, and October 27. Please join us for this learning experience and guided discussion.



The Reflections book group meets Thursday, October 13. We begin at 7 pm in the Parlor. Our October discussion book is *The Personal Librarian* by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray.



Amazon.com offers this summary:

In her twenties, Belle da Costa Greene is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection of rare manuscripts, books, and artwork for his newly built Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture in New York City society and one of the most powerful people in the art and book world, known for her impeccable taste and shrewd negotiating for critical works as she helps create a world-class collection.

But Belle has a secret, one she must protect at all costs. She was born not Belle da Costa Greene but Belle Marion Greener. She is the daughter of Richard Greener, the first Black graduate of Harvard and a well-known advocate for equality. Belle's complexion isn't dark because of her alleged Portuguese heritage that lets her pass as white—her complexion is dark because she is African American.

The *Personal Librarian* tells the story of an extraordinary woman, famous for her intellect, style, and wit, and shares the lengths she must go to—for the protection of her family and her legacy—to preserve her carefully crafted white identity in the racist world in which she lives.
