From the Pastor

It seems like that we live in a time when everyone's goal is to be perpetually healthy and constantly happy. Even though we all know that it is not a true picture of life on this planet, somehow, there is a sense of embarrassment when a trouble or suffering interrupts our lives. And we try to hush it up and lock it in a closet in trying to showcase a wrinkle free life to others.

But Job's anguish in the Bible is the human's epigraph: "Man is born to trouble as the sparks fly upward." (Job 5:7 NIV). And psalmists of the Book of Psalms were honest about this human condition. They didn't hide their troubles that were beyond their control, but cried for help to God. They prayed to the Lord because they knew that they could always put their hope in God, even when the bottom fell out of their lives, because of who God was, is, and will be. Psalms 130 is a great example:

1-2 Help, GOD—I've hit rock bottom!
Master, hear my cry for help!
Listen hard! Open your ears!
Listen to my cries for mercy.

5-6 I pray to GOD—my life a prayer—
and wait for what he'll say and do.
My life's on the line before God, my Lord,
waiting and watching till morning,
waiting and watching till morning. (Psalm 130:1-2, 5-6 MSG)

Friends, if we want to experience the reality of God's presence, power, and provision in our lives, you and I need to pray to God for there is no other way. As

we pray to the Lord, our lives will be on the line before God, then we are able to wait for the Lord “more than watchmen wait for the morning.” We can wait for what God will say and do about what we’ve requested in our prayers with the conviction that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.(Romans 8:28)

The monthly men’s and women’s prayer meetings are places where you are invited to pray with fellow Jesus’ followers who put their hope in Him. Men’s prayer meeting: 1st Thursday of each month at 7 am (this month, June 3, in the church parlor). Audio Video Tech Wanted

MUMC is looking for an individual to lead our tech team (volunteers) in preparing and presenting audio and visual content for church services that are conducted in-person and livestreamed. Approximate total hours per week is 12 to 16 hours. This role is non-exempt, paid hourly.

The individual will be responsible for preparing content for the presentation of church services for in-person and virtual services, for operating the audio and visual equipment during services and managing the livestream event. Creating announcement/presentation video loops to be displayed on church monitors and preparing content and videos for the MUMC website would also be part of the job description.

The individual should have experience with vMix software (or equivalent), the platform for the church's livestreaming broadcasts; experience with editing and presentation software used in our current creation process (for example: PowerPoint, Photoshop, Adobe Premiere or Final Cut Pro). They need to have the ability to troubleshoot technical issues on the fly. This person needs great interpersonal skills to enable collaboration with church members and volunteers in preparing for services, as well as a high level of attention to detail and consistency in process and content.

Outreach Ministries

Featuring Midwest Mission Distribution Center

Each month, Mission Outreach will share with you information about the organizations that we support financially and with "boots on the ground," or directed activities. This month, we are pleased to feature the **Midwest Mission Distribution Center**, one of eight UMCOR cooperating depots in the United States that also collaborates with other nonprofits including Food for the Poor, International Health and Development Network, Project C.U.R.E., and US Southern Command.

The Midwest Mission Distribution Center's expansive campus is located in Pawnee, Illinois, and includes warehouse space and a volunteer dormitory. The organization was established in 2000 to facilitate the distribution of education, health, microbusiness, and disaster relief supplies, nationally and internationally. The Mequon United Methodist Church began its support of the Midwest Mission in 2018 with the Martin Luther King Youth Day of Service, assembling hundreds of hygiene kits for disaster relief efforts. In 2021, we contributed \$500 from the Mission Outreach Auction proceeds to support their mission of "bringing the hearts and hands of God's people together to transform resources into humanitarian relief." For every \$1 donated in 2020, \$9.74 in supplies were sent out to support those in need—a total of 294 domestic and 25 international shipments serving over 1.6 million people. It's an amazing investment in Making God's Love Real!

This year, we are very pleased to join Bethany Methodist Church in Green Bay as a

Permanent Collection Site for the Midwest Mission Distribution Center in Wisconsin. A trailer will be stored in our parking lot and will be used for two major collections of specific items each year. In addition, we will be collecting items used for disaster relief and humanitarian efforts on an as-needed basis and take turns transporting them to Illinois. We anticipate using the trailer as a visual reminder of the Mission Outreach commitment to serving those in need with basic food, shelter, clothing, care, and advocacy, throughout the year. On collection dates, donors may drive into the lot, pop their trunk in front of the trailer, and exit, viewing the Community Garden, Marsh Meadow, and Children's Education Center on the way.

MUMC's COVID-19 Policy Updated

Since the inception of the COVID-19 pandemic, MUMC has followed Center for Disease Control guidelines for safe practices, limiting in-person contact, requiring screening for COVID-19 symptoms, requiring use of face masks, and more. Now, new COVID-19 cases are declining rapidly and the CDC has lifted restrictions on gathering indoors and outdoors and the use of masks. MUMC also recognizes everyone over 12 years old has now had an opportunity to be vaccinated, and we

know most MUMC members have been vaccinated, though we continue to have collective responsibility to protect the most vulnerable among us.

Given all of those considerations, MUMC **will no longer require** COVID-19 screening or wearing of face masks upon entering the church for worship. We will continue to encourage use of face masks for anyone whose health may be compromised or who feels safer wearing a mask. **MUMC will continue** to encourage social distancing with seating spread throughout the sanctuary, and will promote greater air circulation by opening windows and turning on ceiling fans.

While pre-registration to attend in-person worship will no longer be an absolute requirement, we encourage people who wish to attend in-person worship to pre-register weekly by Saturday so that we are able to monitor and prepare for distanced seating needs.

We look forward to seeing more and more of our church family on Sundays. **Come and rejoice!**

From the Wisconsin Conference

Editor's note: Since the beginning of the pandemic, the Cabinet in our Wisconsin Conference has posted daily devotions, called Reflections, that are worthwhile reading. Each one is well written and thought provoking; many, like the two below, are exceptionally so.

Reflection for May 1, 2021 By Dan Dick

The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles. (Acts 10:45 NIV)

Even on the Gentiles... Today we don't really understand the context of biblical authors writing about Gentiles. It would be easy to simply see them as non-Jews, those outside the circle of God's chosen people, but this is inaccurate. For Jewish people, in the time of the early Christian movement, Gentiles were despised,

reviled, distrusted, and hated. Gentiles engaged in outrageous and immoral acts. Gentiles were oppressors and violent aggressors. Gentiles were enemies, opponents, the conquering opposition. Jews worked very hard to steer clear of Gentiles, holding fast to the belief that they were superior to Gentiles in every important way. What must the Jewish people have felt when they saw God's grace and Spirit manifest in their Gentile adversaries?

Why do we as human beings continuously look for ways and reasons to disdain and reject other people? It seems grounded in our very DNA to establish mores and methods to differentiate who is acceptable from who is not. Who is good and who is evil? Who is the saint and who is the sinner? Who is superior and who is inferior? How do we keep those people away from our community? It is perhaps an innate survival tendency to put up walls and barriers that protect us from them, but Jesus and the will of God explode those barriers and break down those walls – God loves us all equally.

Some people find this idea challenging and even threatening or reprehensible. How is it possible that God could love those whom we have deemed unacceptable? The simple answer is this: God loves all us sinners and God could care less about the immaterial reasons and excuses we come up with to tear ourselves apart. God's love is greater than our divisions. God's grace smothers our contempts and disrespects. God's will is for all people to be joined together in one blessed fellowship and beloved community of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23). We may not be able to tolerate one another, but God isn't influenced by our limitations and inadequacies.

This is why we have been given the gift of the church: to learn to love others as God loves us. In the Christian community, we are called to love the Lord with all our heart, soul, mind, and spirit, and to love our neighbor as we love ourselves. Jesus summarized all of the Law and Prophecy from Jewish history into this simple commandment. Love. How hard can it be?

Only as hard as we make it. We can give our energy to finding ways to dislike, disrespect, judge, and condemn others or we can give ourselves over to God. If we give ourselves to God, God will fill us with the Holy Spirit. And in the grace of God's Holy Spirit we will learn true love, even love for the Gentiles!

Prayer: Teach us, O Lord, that your name is Love. Possess us with your Holy Spirit that in all that we say and all that we think and all that we do, your divine love is manifest. We ask this humbly yet sincerely in Jesus' sacred name. Amen.

Reflection for May 9, 2021 by Bishop Hee-Soo Jung

While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.' (Acts 1:10-11)

"Why do you stand looking up towards heaven?" I love this part of the story of the ascension of Jesus. Jesus leaves the disciples, is taken into heaven, and the disciples stand watching, looking at the empty sky. Two men in white robes – the same perhaps from Jesus' tomb? – view this spectacle and essentially remark, "Don't just stand there gawking – do something!"

It is fine for us to anxiously await the return of Jesus Christ and the arrival of a new heaven and a new earth, but in the meantime, we need to do something. Following the words of the author of the Epistle of James, we need to be doers of the Word and not hearers only.

But what should we do? Well, feed the hungry and clothe the naked come to mind. Welcome the stranger. Visit the sick and imprisoned. Show mercy and compassion. Make peace and act with justice. Forgive enemies and extend grace to all people. Give generously of our resources and share from our abundance. Be kind and gentle and patient. Exercise solid self-control, and do all in your power to bring joy into the lives of other people. Don't gossip or insult or accuse. Don't judge or condemn. Don't be prejudiced and think more highly of yourself than you ought to. Be humble, authentic, and honest. Act with integrity and avoid hypocrisy. Work to unite and create harmony and goodwill. Have fun and laugh and stay positive. There, this is a short list that could take us a lifetime to fulfill.

We very easily recite the Great Commandment – to love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength, and to love our neighbors as we love ourselves – but how well do we engage in the exercises and opportunities to practice it? When we give our time and energy to doing all the good we can, we leave ourselves no time or space to do harm. It is not enough for us to stare up into heaven asking, “How long, how long, O Lord?” when there is so very much good that needs to be done, right here, right now.

This week, reflect on these words from the Apostle Paul to the church at Colossae: As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him. (Colossians 3:12-17)

Prayer: Active and eternally creating God, do not let us waste our time and gifts in complacency and passive expectation. Instead, fill us to overflowing and inspire us to share all the good we can with all the people we can in all the places we can wherever we can. We ask in the name of the Christ Jesus. Amen.
