## From the Pastor

Thanksgiving Day is in a month! Even though we have Thanksgiving Day once a year, our Father in heaven loves to see us make every day into a little Thanksgiving Day: "Give thanks in all circumstances for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18). Yet, you may say, "How can I give thanks when I am buried with medical bills, when I have a relationship problem with my spouse or child, or when my loved one has an incurable disease? How can God expect me to give thanks in all circumstances? How can I do that? I can't!" You're right! You can't do that...alone.

Friends, giving thanks in all circumstances takes a church – brothers and sisters in Christ who have committed to follow Jesus Christ no matter what. When you can't give thanks to the Lord by yourself, your church family can do that *for* you until you can do it by yourself again. That is what our baptismal vow is all about. There is no such thing as an isolated Christian. A Christian who tries to live apart from her/his church is like a log that's been removed from the fire. Separated from the other wood, it doesn't have much of a chance to continue burning – not for long, anyway. Eventually the glow and warmth of its flame will fade. But for the logs that remain in the fire, each helps the other to burn brighter and hotter. This is true for a pastor as well since she/he has a hard time giving thanks in all circumstances from time to time.

During my walk to follow Jesus in 2019, many faithful MUMC leaders, members, and friends were there and gave thanks to the Lord for me when I had a hard time giving thanks to the Lord by myself. And they reminded me of what faithfully following the Lord was all about with their unwavering faithfulness, sacrificial giving, and heartfelt good works for Christ. So thank you for your helping me to continue to "burn" my love for Christ when I needed a gentle but strong push from my fellow followers of Christ Jesus. May our walk with the Lord be brighter and hotter as we faithfully follow Him!

*Writing at the height of her narrative and imaginative gifts, Sue Monk Kidd presents a masterpiece of hope, daring, the quest for freedom, and the desire to have a voice in the world.*

*Hetty "Handful" Grimke, an urban slave in early nineteenth century Charleston, yearns for life*

*beyond the suffocating walls that enclose her within the wealthy Grimke household. The Grimke's daughter, Sarah, has known from an early age she is meant to do something large in the world, but she is hemmed in by the limits imposed on women.*

*Kidd's sweeping novel is set in motion on Sarah's eleventh birthday, when she is given ownership of ten year old Handful, who is to be her handmaid. We follow their remarkable journeys over the next thirty five years, as both strive for a life of their own, dramatically shaping each other's destinies and forming a complex relationship marked by guilt, defiance, estrangement and the uneasy ways of love.*

## Community Garden Wrap Up

Jim Layton reports that our community garden really took shape this past summer. We had ten active plots that produced more than 100 pounds of produce. Our crops went to our local food pantries, church members, and neighbors.

The real story for 2019 was our growth over last year. The garden showed its value as a community outreach to neighbors and the community. It started at our outreach fund raiser last February when we raised \$1,200 for our outreach program by offering a garden and gardener. And we thank Connie Pukaite and Doug and Shelley Burns for participating in this gardening experiment. We also want to recognize Ed Mordy for helping us establish Ed's Berry Patch with gooseberries and raspberries. Our outreach continued when neighbors, like Bob and Lori Dominiczak, joined our community garden. Many of our gardens benefited with the planting of extra plants the Dominiczaks shared.

But all good stories have a villain and ours was the load of soil we purchased from a local company. For some reason, the garden blend was not right with very little phosphorus and a high pH which resulted in poor plant growth. By the time we had the soil tested it was a little too late for this year; our production could have been twice as much. The problem has now been corrected with UW Extension's recommendations and a nice winter mulch of organic compost. And we are praying for more garden plots and gardeners next year. Plus, this fall we will establish the Byron Jackson Memorial Garden with a stone plaque. The garden will be planted with Byron's favorite plants – hot peppers – and will be a fall service project for our Boy Scout Troop 865.

Our goal for next year is to add eight more plots and involve more of our neighbors while producing more than 500 pounds of produce.

Again, thank you for my pen. And thank you for the certificate of appreciation which I will cherish as I remember all of our years at MUMC.

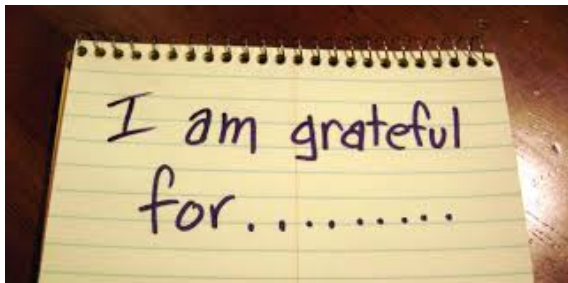
