

Lunch Bunch Bible Study

Lunch Bunch will start a new study, Invitation to John: A Short-Term Disciple Bible Study on December 10, 2019.

About the study: These life-changing courses are ideal for busy people who are unable to commit to longer studies. These studies embody the same trusted scholarship as the Disciple foundational studies and include the same core activities--independent reading, weekly small groups, and video presentations by scholars. Participants for this Invitation to John bible study do not have to have an in depth knowledge of the Bible to enjoy and benefit from participation. Reading just two chapters of John a week, they will discover the life-altering stories that will invite them to follow Christ as true disciples.

About the author: Robert D. Kysar, Bandy Professor Emeritus of Preaching and New Testament, Candler School of Theology, is a noted scholar on the Gospel of John. He has authored numerous articles and books, including a revised edition of John: The Maverick Gospel; Preaching John; and, most recently, Voyages With John: Charting the Fourth Gospel.

Connectional News

What is a Jurisdictional Conference?

In the United States of America, The United Methodist Church is divided into five areas known as jurisdictions: Northeastern, Southeastern, North Central, South Central, and Western. These provide some program and leadership training events to support the annual conferences. Every four years the jurisdictional conferences meet to elect new bishops and select members of general boards and agencies. Wisconsin is in the North Central Jurisdictional (NCJ) Conference. The next NCJ Conference is scheduled for July 15 -18, 2020, in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

What is the General Conference?

The General Conference, the primary legislative body of The United Methodist Church, is the only body that speaks officially for the church. It is an international body of nearly 1,000 delegates that generally meets every four years with the exception of special sessions. The delegates are elected by annual conferences (at annual conference sessions) to attend General Conference. They represent all annual conferences around the world. Half of the delegates are laity (non-clergy members), half are clergy. The next General Conference is scheduled for May 5 - 15, 2020, in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Statement from North Central Jurisdiction Delegates

General and jurisdictional delegates from the North Central Jurisdiction released a statement, in the form of a Press Release, acknowledging and apologizing for harm to LGBTQ individuals in the past and for potential harm that could begin January 1, 2020, when the Traditional Plan goes into effect. The delegates also called for a moratorium on complaints related to same-gender weddings and LGBTQ identity and credentialing, and said they want to elect bishops in 2020 who will join in these commitments.

General and Jurisdictional delegates from the North Central Jurisdiction (NCJ), meeting in suburban Chicago, have released the following statement:

Gathering on November 8 and 9, 2019, in a crucial moment in the life of The United Methodist Church, we, 140 members present and voting from the North Central Jurisdiction's Annual Conference delegations and the North Central Jurisdiction's Mission Council, through honest, prayerful dialogue, discerned the following:

We as NCJ delegations acknowledge and apologize for the harm that is being done and the escalation of potential harm that will begin January 1, 2020. We repent of the ways we have abused our privilege and the ways that it has harmed the marginalized.

We witness the Holy Spirit moving in our midst. We witness God's seeking, saving, healing and liberating grace at work in our communities. We renew our commitment to follow the Spirit's leading and joining in God's gracious work.

We believe that God is not finished with the people called United Methodist. We renew our commitment to lead our conferences, congregations, and ministry settings in "making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world" in just, compassionate, creative, equitable, and innovative ways.

We call NCJ laity, clergy, Annual Conferences, and bishops to covenant to a moratorium on complaints, charges, and trials related to officiating same gendered weddings and LGBTQIA+ identity and credentialing.

We call laity, clergy, Annual Conferences, Boards of Ordained Ministry, and bishops to covenant for greater freedom and diversity for ministry with LGBTQIA+ people.

We will hold accountable and support laity, clergy, Annual Conferences, and bishops in these commitments and calls.

When we gather for the 2020 NCJ Conference, we desire to elect bishops who will join us in these commitments and calls.

ADOPTED November 9, 2019

80% support, 18% do not support, 2% abstain

The statement was written during a Pre-General Conference gathering. The 177 delegates, alternates, and the Mission Council from around the Jurisdiction were guided through small group discussions and open conversations. While officially non-binding, the statement was adopted by a vote of: YES: 80% NO: 18% ABSTAIN: 2%

NCJ Mission Council Chairperson, Ryan M. Russell, described the outcome: “As the chair of the Mission Council, I had some concrete hopes for the gathering. As the body worked together, the spirit of openness and respect was present even with some disagreement. I am heartened that we as the United Methodist in the NCJ were able to come to a common place with the document adopted by this gathering.”

Giving Until It Feels Good

Within each and every heart is an enormous capacity for generosity. We love to give. We love to make other people feel good. We love the warm feeling inside when we do something kind or helpful. There is a wonderful power to the act of giving. True generosity can change the world.

The size of the gift really doesn't matter. When we live from a center of generosity, we never ask if we have enough to give. Instead, we give from everything we have. Some people actually say that giving is selfish — because the more we give, the more satisfaction we receive. Who doesn't like feeling good?

Too often, we allow giving to become a duty or obligation. We don't give because we want to; we give because we feel we have to. Resentment poisons the wellspring of giving. We sometimes feel that our gifts aren't appreciated, or that no matter how much we give, it is never enough. The church should be a place that counters such toxic thinking. God loves a cheerful giver.

In the church, we should offer people as many opportunities to give as we possibly can, but with permission to support those things that matter most to them. If we trust that God is working in the hearts and minds of all our church family, we won't worry about not having enough. In every congregation, we have people who love God, who love the church, who love one another, and who would love to make the world a better place. Let's focus on this: making all this love tangible and available to all.

Each and every United Methodist is invited to support “a portion” of the ministry of the church. This “a portionment” is a way to include everyone in the miraculous healing grace of God in the world. Each congregation is assigned “a portion” of the work of the global church. These “portions” combine to allow us to do some amazing work in the body of Christ.

Let's work together to be proud of our giving, to be excited by the opportunities and possibilities that generous giving allows. Individuals may feel small and inadequate when faced with the enormity of our world's problems. Small congregations may wonder why they


should bother giving at all. Even our larger churches may think that their giving is a very small drop in a vast ocean of need. But we are more than a collection of individuals and solo congregations. We are more than a hodge-podge of conferences and boards and agencies and caucuses and ministries. We are The United Methodist Church. We are Christian disciples and members of the body of Christ. Every gift we give makes a difference. Every contribution we make undergoes the miraculous blessing of God, multiplied, sanctified, and synergized. Together we are more than the sum of our parts, because the Holy Spirit is at work with us to make each “a-portion-ment” an outward and visible sign of the inward and spiritual grace we have received from God. Indeed, we rejoice, because God is using us to bring Joy to the World. Thanks be to God for this glorious opportunity.

Isaiah 9:2 - 7

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined. You have multiplied the nation, you have increased its joy; they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder. For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian. Questions for Reflection and Discussion

3. How might we redefine and reframe apportionments as “gifts, blessings and opportunities” instead of “obligations, expenses, or burdens”?
