

Mission News from Gordon Graner in the Dominican Republic

February 2020

Dear Friends,

Ardell and I have returned to the Dominican Republic after five months of visiting our covenant churches in the USA. Visiting covenant churches has always been an important part of our missionary life and we are grateful for all the hospitality and joy of Christian fellowship. We hope that we were able to communicate our shared mission and express to you the passion that we feel. You have sponsored our missionary life over the past 30 years. What a gift you have given us!

after being so long in the tropical heat and humidity. I got in on the comforting cold of the fall and first stage of winter that makes me feel sentimental. Later I also got a taste of driving on ice and through a snowstorm with a white-knuckle grip on the steering wheel. And finally I had some outings where I felt the sting of bitter cold while not properly dressed for the occasion. That was a painful reminder that winter can be serious, fiercely cold. But before the winter really set in we came south to the warmer climate of the DR with temperatures in the 80's on January 2, 2020.

I have made the decision to officially retire from the General Board of Global Ministries, effective September 1, 2020. However, I will continue to work with Ardell in the Dominican Republic as a volunteer. My work activity will remain much the same: hosting volunteers in mission, solar oven mission, Church Development in the DR, and writing. Ardell will continue as an official missionary with GBGM in her full capacity.

I am very grateful to all of you who have supported me over the past 31 years. Your financial support, prayers, and friendship have made this journey possible and filled my life with grace. It has been an honor and a privilege to be in covenant with you as mission partners. I hope you will continue in your missionary giving and consider shifting your support to Ardell (Advance # 10836Z). I will continue to write for our newsletters and for our website, www.granerfamily.org, so that we may remain in touch.

We were only back five days before taking to the road for a solar oven mission event near the border of Haiti in the region of a bustling market town known as Dajabón. An UVMIM team of 12 came to us. We, the Dominican team, were only four but, together with our northern brothers and sisters, we were enough. We welcomed Marj, Karen, Ruth, Rita and Paul, Clinton, Susan, Harvey, Renae, Shirley, Gene, and Jeneyene. Gene said it best one night at the dinner table, "What a privilege it is to be with such good people!" I seconded that sentiment and added, "Mil gracias (a thousand thanks)!"

We were counting on the arrival of an oven shipment to have enough to distribute at three new sites. After working at the towns of Partido, Sabaneta, and Cabrera, we took orders for about 200 ovens but only had 70 ovens available. At all three towns we had to do a drawing to see who would get the 23 ovens now and who would wait until the new shipment arrived. The drawing created an atmosphere of excitement. When the names of the winners were announced there were shrieks, applause, and laughter. One woman even claimed that in her morning devotions God had given her a word from the Bible about winning something. She literally jumped up and down and shouted for joy.

We had a number of retired teachers on the team, one by the name of Ruth. I could tell she was a smart teacher by all the questions she asked me — questions that I could not answer properly. My answers were peppered with, "I'm not sure..." or "probably..." or "it could be that..." Ruth called me to account, "You live here, how come you don't know the answers to my questions?" So I said, "OK listen, ask me a really hard question about the USA and if I can answer it then you have to stop pestering me. Agreed?" She agreed. She thought for a while and came up with this question, "In the USA how many persons per year are struck by lightning while on a hayride?" Luckily she had asked a question that was within my sphere of knowledge as I happen to be an expert on hayrides. I answered with authority, "Three!" Ruth's jaw dropped and she said, "I cannot believe you knew that!"

From the Pastor

What was the first word the risen Christ said to the frightened disciples? Yes! It was "peace". Jesus said, "Peace be with you!" He didn't mean any peace but the peace He had mentioned to His disciples at their last meal. On the night before He was crucified, Jesus said to His fearful and anxious disciples, "I leave with you; *my peace* I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid."

What is the defining characteristic of Jesus' peace? The Apostle Paul described this type of peace in Philippians 4:6 – 7. "6 Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with *thanksgiving*, present your requests to God. 7 And *the peace of God*, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

Friends, the peace of God transcends our human understanding. Humanly speaking, in the midst of overwhelming storms, we are to be fearful and anxious, but with the presence of Christ in us, we can have His peace and dwell in it, like staying in the eye of the storms. We're living in anxious times walking on an uncharted road. But our Lord wants His followers, you and me, to claim and dwell in His peace, not because there are no storms in our lives, but, despite the storms, knowing and acknowledging His never-failing presence with us. And He blesses us to live in the reality of God, whose presence delivers us from all our fear and anxiety even though we walk through the valley of the shadow of death. This never-failing presence of God is what Easter is all about.

Believers, our Lord Jesus is risen and we are Easter people. So do not be anxious about anything, but claim His peace in your life *day by day, or moment by moment if you need to*, and dwell in it today, tomorrow, and always.

Peace of the Lord be with you!

3 Because thy loving kindness is better than life, my lips shall praise thee.
4 Thus will I bless thee while I live: I will lift up my hands in thy name.'**

By the way, my great-grandmother had most of the Psalms memorized and could recite them. This is one I remember hearing from her."

Mequon Cares Program

The Mequon Police Department is proud to have a program called Mequon Cares. This program is designed to assist the many Mequon residents who live alone and are not in daily contact with relatives or friends and may have an accident or become ill.

Anyone who enrolls in the Mequon Cares program is known as an "enrolled resident".

The program is designed to have the enrolled resident call the Mequon Police Department at (262) 242-3500 **every day before noon**. If the enrolled resident forgets to call, the dispatcher will attempt to reach that enrolled resident by telephone. If they get no answer, the dispatcher will send a police officer to check on the enrolled resident's well-being.

If the Mequon Police Department cannot make contact with the enrolled resident, as a last resort, they will force entry into the home in an attempt to check on the well-being of the enrolled resident. It is very important that the enrolled resident lets the Mequon Police Department know if they will be out of their residence for any length of time for any reason, including vacations and hospitalizations.

The service is free and confidential for any resident of the City of Mequon.

To enroll, call the department at (262) 242-3500 and ask to speak to a clerk to sign up for the Mequon Cares program over the phone.


News From Children's Ministries



Apportionment News

April — God Is Our Salvation!

With All Our Heart and Soul and Mind and Strength

For many, the concept of salvation is purely a matter of what God does for us — through faith we receive eternal life. This is one vision of salvation offered in our scriptures, but it is fairly simplistic and one-dimensional. There is a danger in spiritualizing such an important concept. Salvation is not a spiritual “get out of jail free” card that we can redeem at some appropriate time in the future. The saving work of God through Jesus Christ is a holistic process that is constantly occurring. It is a transformation that involves body, mind and spirit — the whole person is “saved.” In the physical realm, salvation demands adequate food, shelter, healthcare, education, clothing, and security. For the mind, salvation includes stimulation, challenge, engagement, nurture, and development. For the spirit, salvation sets us on a path to oneness with God and unity in the body of Christ. It is an experience of “the now and the not yet” — new each day and extending forever into the future.

The work of personal salvation demands a deep level of commitment and sacrifice. It places the work and will of God ahead of each individual’s own needs and desires. The work of communal salvation is a lesson in synergy—each individual connects with the larger group offering gifts, knowledge, experience, talents, and passions in such a way that the total is greater than the sum of the parts. The work of global salvation is ongoing, immense, and never-ending. We are called to be faithful stewards together to transform the world. Gifted individuals knit together as the body of Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit to extend God’s grace to everyone on the planet.

Apportionments are a critically vital way we engage in the work of God’s salvation. Through our giving, the good news of Jesus Christ is not only proclaimed, but modeled, mentored, nurtured, and shared around the globe. We could not be in such important and impactful work were it not for the faithful, sacrificial giving of individuals, congregations, and conferences throughout The United Methodist Church. What we give is not just a nice thing; it is a matter of life and death for millions. And beyond that, it is a matter of salvation in body, mind, and spirit.

Africa University

One grand example of saving grace in The United Methodist Church is Africa University. In the 1980s, leaders from around the world lamented that missionary work and short-term mission projects were not making the impact needed to save lives in Africa. So many young men and women escaped hardship to attend colleges and universities elsewhere, so that many of the best and brightest hearts and minds were lost to Africa forever. The question was raised, “What if there were a university in Africa to prepare leaders for Africa?”

The obstacles to such a vision and dream seemed insurmountable, but through the financial and human resources of The United Methodist Church, the dream became a reality within a

decade. Today, Africa University educates and trains leaders in healthcare and medicine, agriculture and natural sciences, education, economics and management, leadership, theology, and governance. Lives are transformed in body, mind and spirit — transforming the world and offering salvation to a whole generation of young people. No one individual could have made this happen. No one church. No one conference. But together as The United Methodist Church, we offer a global witness to what can be accomplished when everyone does their part.

We cannot do everything, but we can do just about anything we put our hearts and minds to. It is not resources we lack, but faith and imagination. When the vision is big enough and compelling enough, the financial resources appear. The reason we struggle to pay our apportionments is not that we lack adequate funds; it is that we are ignorant of the amazing grace and wonderful work our apportionments make possible.

Prayerfully consider what it would mean in your congregation to make apportionments the top priority — that which we pay in full first, rather than waiting to see what we can afford.

Matthew 19:16-26

Then someone came to him and said, “Teacher, what good deed must I do to have eternal life?” And he said to him, “Why do you ask me about what is good? There is only one who is good. If you wish to enter into life, keep the commandments.” He said to him, “Which ones?” And Jesus said, “You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; Honor your father and mother; also, You shall love your neighbor as yourself.” The young man said to him, “I have kept all these; what do I still lack?” Jesus said to him, “If you wish to be perfect, go, sell your possessions, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.” When the young man heard this word, he went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

Then Jesus said to his disciples, “Truly I tell you, it will be hard for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven. Again I tell you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.” When the disciples heard this, they were greatly astounded and said, “Then who can be saved?” But Jesus looked at them and said, “For mortals it is impossible, but for God all things are possible.”

Questions for Reflection and Discussion

1. What does it mean to you to receive salvation?
2. To whom does God extend salvation? (Who can be saved?) What is our role and responsibility in extending God’s invitation to inherit eternal life?
3. In what ways are we God’s partners in the work of salvation? What resources are necessary to proclaim salvation to the ends of the earth?
