Lenten All-Church Growth Group Study Begins Soon

He Chose the Nails by Max Lucado

There is no difference, for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus. God presented him as a sacrifice of atonement, through faith in his blood. Romans 3:22-25 NIV

Every gift from God reveals his love. But no gift reveals his love more than the gift of the cross. Much has been said about the gift of the cross itself, but what of the other gifts? What of the nails, the crown of thorns? The garments taken by the soldiers? The garments given for the burial? Have we taken time to open these gifts? Jesus didn't have to give them, you know. The only act required for our salvation was the shedding of blood. Yet he did so much more.

The hill of the cross is rich with God's gifts. So let's examine them. Let's unwrap the gifts of grace as if for the first time. And as we touch them, as we feel the timber of the cross and trace the braid of the

crown and finger the point of the spike, we need to pause and listen. Perchance we will hear him whisper: *I did it just for you.*

In accordance with our mission to connect people to Jesus Christ and each other, please prayerfully consider committing to participate in our all-church studies. It will be a 4-week study, offered twice each session:

The sessions include:

Weekly Devotion for February 6, 2023, by Bishop Hee-Soo Jung

Children of God

You are all God's children through faith in Christ Jesus. All of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek; there is neither slave nor free; nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. Now if you belong to Christ, then indeed you are Abraham's descendants, heirs according to the promise. Galatians 3:26-29, CEB

When I am with my granddaughter, Sydney, I think about the significance of my relationship with her. I think about how much I love her unconditionally. I am blessed to be in a relationship with her: it is in our talks, simple walks, and shared

meals that brings us mutual enjoyment. It is true joy.

As I reflect on my relationship with Sydney, I think about an essential Christian principle, of relationship building with God, each other, and with all of God's creation. As we know, our earthly relationships take place in an ever-changing world that requires deep mutual understanding, love, learning, and humble self-sacrifice that transcends prejudice.

We love and respect each other because we are all God's children. Paul describes this unity in God as the familial intimacy of children. It is through the baptism that we become siblings who share one blood.

Dear siblings, how much these words and confessions can unite us and become the premise of our identity. We can become one, so these words and confession become covenants and promises. "...for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ" (verse 27).

I hope that we will embrace again, with gratitude, the premise that the source of our identity is Jesus Christ and take responsibility for our mission together. May we continue as partners and friends in ministry with care and love, advancing the kingdom of God through our kinship in Christ Jesus. Amen.

Weekly Devotion for February 27, 2023, by M. Park Hunter

Anyone and Everyone

Nicodemus said, 'How are these things possible?' Jesus answered, 'You are a teacher of Israel, and you don't know these things? ... God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him won't perish but will have eternal life. God didn't send his Son into the world to judge the world, but that the world might be saved through him.' John 3:9-10,16-17 CEB

John 3:16 is perhaps the most famous and beloved Bible verse in the world. Martin Luther, who launched the Protestant reformation, called this "the gospel in miniature." And indeed, it is good news, the best of news! God loves us and wants to save us; that's why Jesus came. If we believe in Jesus, we'll have eternal life.

Eugene Peterson's paraphrase, The Message, drives the point home like a rock star's mic drop: "This is how much God loved the world: He gave us his Son, his one and only Son. And this is why: so that no one need be destroyed; by believing in him, anyone can have a whole and lasting life." Boom. This is the way.

We are now in the season of Lent, the 40 days of reflection and repentance leading to Holy Week and Easter. We began this season with snow and ashes and long dark nights. Reflecting on how we've fallen short and failed our Lord is an important and humbling part of our journey to the cross.

But lest we be tempted to judge ourselves – or others! – too harshly, it is good to read on. The very next verse, John 3:17, furthers clarifies Jesus' mission: he did not come to judge or to condemn, but to offer salvation. Jesus holds his open hand out to the world, inviting us, beckoning us, offering us a precious gift freely given.

It's the height of human pride to think that we are too sinful for Jesus to save us. It is the height of human hypocrisy to judge that others are outside the reach of God's grace. Jesus might well look at us with the same astonished expression he

showed Nicodemus: "How is it you claim to follow me and don't know these things?!"

Because that's the gospel in a nutshell. Jesus doesn't lead with judgment, but with grace. Jesus doesn't hoard the golden tickets but lavishes the world with love. We can't put a box around his generous offer. God sent Jesus so that anyone, everyone – you, me, those folks across the aisle, the people down the street, the guy on TV, the person you hate most – everyone and anyone can have eternal life through him.

Odds are, when we get to heaven, we're going to be surprised by all the folks we meet. (Some of them might be surprised to see us, too!) But what a day of rejoicing that will be!

Prayer: Lord, as we journey through Lent, recall to our hearts and minds our sins, so that we might repent. But also remind us of your love, so high and deep and wide that no obstacle can block it. May we live brighter, holier lives that dispel the gloom of this world, that others might know love and hope. And may we move together through darkness toward the glory of the resurrection. Amen.

Christian Symbol of the Month

Coins—The Bible often uses coins to symbolize human greed. During Holy Week, 30 silver coins – usually shown with a bag or purse – represent Jesus' betrayal by his disciple Judas (Matthew 26:14-16). Many of Jesus' teachings are about money, including the parable of the lost coin. Coins also symbolize giving as an act of worship, just as the widow offered her last two coins, worth only a few cents. Mark 12:41-44
