Highlights of the 2023 Annual Conference



Theme: On Earth as it is in Heaven: Engaging in Transformative Community Building

Phillipians 2:1-4

Therefore if you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any common sharing in the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, 2 then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and of one mind. 3 Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, for not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others.

I want to thank the congregation and Pastor Sue for allowing me the opportunity to be the lay delegate to the annual conference. I was truly moved by the music, worship experiences, and fellowship. Methodists love to sing, and the music was wonderful.

One of the main items of business was the churches seeking to leave the UMC denomination over divisions in granting equal rights to all. I'm going to take a minute to provide a bit of context for this.

The 2019 Special Session of the United Methodist General Conference, which is an international body representing churches world-wide, passed the Traditional Plan, which increased penalties for United Methodist Clergy who are LGBTQIA+ and for clergy who support the LGBTQIA+ community through officiating at their weddings. The adoption of the Traditional Plan caused a lot of outrage and feelings of alienation, leaving many people wondering if the UMC is truly the loving community it professes to be.

In 2022, the North Central Jurisdictional Conference, which includes Wisconsin, in an attempt to address the divide, adopted a moratorium or abeyance in enforcement of penalties under the Traditional Plan, which basically acknowledges this rule but states that it will not be enforced. Complaints will be acknowledged in a timely way, but no punitive consequences will result. At the same time, a process was created to allow churches who deny rights to the LGBTQIA+ community a way to leave the denomination.

As we have seen since, the majority of our pastors and members are in favor of full rights for all, but about 10% of congregations have decided to leave the denomination over this issue, a process called disaffiliation. Recognizing the deep grief and challenges this entails, our conference set up a process to allow churches to disaffiliate, as long as they met certain criteria: their apportionments were paid in full; they were up to date with their clergy pension and health-care contributions;

completing a deliberate and prayerful process and taking a vote, churches could leave the UMC and keep their assets, such as their church buildings. 43 Wisconsin churches completed this process in the timeline allocated. The 2023 Wisconsin General Conference voted to accept all 43 disaffiliation motions on June 9th. This represents ~10% of the UMC churches in the Wisconsin conference. There is a plan in place to reach out to members and clergy of the disaffiliating churches who do not agree with the decision, to assist them in finding a new home in the UMC.

There was a lot of talk about healing moving forward and the heartbreak in the disaffiliating churches. I wish there had been more discussion regarding healing the people who felt pushed out and rejected by passage of the Traditional Plan, and historically had to go their whole lives without being accepted into clergy or being able to marry in the church they were baptized in (my personal opinion). In addition to the disaffiliating churches, 6 churches voted to discontinue their ministry for other reasons. In the Milwaukee area, the historic Summerfield congregation downtown on Juneau is closing. We celebrated that in the past, a great many people have been sustained on their faith journey through these churches, and recognize that there is a season for all things. Churches who vote to discontinue return their church buildings and assets to the conference.

The church statistician reported that as a conference, with these closings, disaffiliations, and membership declines that all mainline Protestant churches are experiencing, our membership has gone from 49,826 in the year of 2021 to 42,233 in 2023 statewide. In recognition of this, the state will go from 5 to 4 districts, eliminating one district superintendent position.

The annual conference held elections for provisional reserve delegates to the postponed 2020 General and Jurisdictional Conferences, since many of the delegates nominated pre-pandemic are no longer available to fulfill this commitment.

Finally, there was a workshop on understanding differences, and being more understanding and accepting of cultural differences.

Family Promise Volunteers Needed

DO YOU ENJOY HELPING OTHERS? Here's an opportunity for you!

During the work-week of August 21 through 25, MUMC volunteers will be needed to help prepare evening meals for homeless individuals and families who are at the Family Promise Portlight Shelter. Currently, there are 6 adults and 3 children at Portlight ... that can and does change weekly, sometimes by the day. Now that the static shelter is in place, it's easier than ever to help our neighbors in need. We can prepare entre' dishes to serve family-style, and since Family Promise is partnering with Ozaukee's food pantries, some parts of the meals – bread, salad, drinks – do not need to be provided by our church volunteers.

Volunteer Meal Helpers have options:

- Cook an entre' or make a homemade dessert, or do both; or just deliver & set up the food at the Shelter
- Cook at home and deliver the meal to the Shelter, or to the church for

- another volunteer to deliver to the Shelter (15 minutes away in Port Washington)
- Bring ingredients & cook at the Shelter ... the aroma of homemade food cooking is a comfort
- Deliver the food and stay to serve, eat and visit with our homeless guests
- Set up the food buffet-style for self-service and leave guests with the opportunity to manage their own & family's meal time and clean up

Hunger Task Force Drive



On August 6th we will begin our food collection drive for Hunger Task Force. Our theme is "back to school." Please donate food that schools and other child hunger organizations serve to make sure children have the nutritious meals they need to succeed. We are also collecting school supplies, such as pencils, art supplies, notebooks, note paper, and fun things like stickers.

Aug. 6th Think Breakfast! What do children need for a good, nutritious breakfast? Whole grain cereals, oatmeal, orange juice, canned fruit, milk (Boxed low-fat milk or milk alternatives).

August 13th What will children need for lunch? Soup, canned vegetables, canned meats (tuna, chicken), canned beans, peanut butter.

August 20^h Healthy after school snacks! Granola bars, nuts and seeds, raisins, Graham crackers, milk (boxed, low-fat or milk alternatives).

August 27th Dinner time! Spaghetti, Spaghetti sauce, canned dinners (Chow Mein), stews, beans, chili, canned vegetables, canned fruit.

Everything must be non-perishable, low or no sugar, processed in fruit or vegetable juices, and whole grains.

Food collection boxes will be in the church entrance and the Narthex. Bins for school supplies will be by the Sanctuary entrance.

Prayers and Reflections

Jacob left Beer-sheba and went toward Haran. He came to a certain place and stayed there for the night, because the sun had set. Taking one of the stones of the place, he put it under his head and lay down in that place. And he dreamed that there was a ladder set up on the earth, the top of it reaching to heaven; and the angels of God were ascending and descending on it. And the LORD stood beside him and said, "I am the LORD, the God of Abraham your father and the God of Isaac; the land on which you lie I will give to you and to your offspring; and your offspring shall be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north and to the south; and all the families of the earth shall be blessed in you and in your offspring. Know that I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land; for I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you." Then Jacob woke from his sleep and said, "Surely the LORD is in this place--and I did not know it!" And he was afraid, and said, "How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God,
